Has the Fund achieved its objective?

For the financial period under review, the Fund has met its objective i.e. passively managed against the given benchmark and the return corresponded closely to the performance of the benchmark index.

Fund Performance


For the financial period under review, the Fund recorded a return of 0.56% comprising of negative 1.02% capital and 1.58% income distribution.

Thus, the Fund's return of 0.56% has underperformed the benchmark return of 0.74% by 0.18%.

As compared to 30 June 2012, the NAV per unit of the Fund decreased by 1.02% from RM1.1049 to RM1.0936, while units in circulation remain unchanged at 537,421,800 units.

The closing price quoted at Bursa Malaysia of the Fund increased by 2.89% from RM1.0720 to RM1.103.


Strategies and Policies Employed For the financial period under review, the Fund used a passive strategy whereby the Manager aims, by way of representative sampling, to achieve a return on the Fund Assets that closely tracks the returns of the benchmark index.

There has been a change to the asset allocation since the last reporting period due to our regular portfolio rebalancing exercise. Investment in Malaysian Government Securities (MGS) bonds decreased by 11.9% while investments in Quasi-Government bonds increased by 10.4%. Meanwhile, investment in cash increased by 1.5%.

State of Affairs of the Fund

There has been neither significant change to the state of affairs of the Fund nor any circumstances that materially affect any interests of the unit holders during the financial period under review.

Rebates and Soft Commission

It is our policy to pay all rebates to the Fund. However, soft commissions received for goods and services such as fundamental database, financial wire services, technical analysis software and stock quotation system incidental to investment management of the Fund are retained by the Manager. For the financial period under review, the Manager has received soft commissions.

Market Review

Malaysian Government Securities (MGS)/Global Innovation Index (GII) trading volume was healthy throughout the month of July as investors were fairly bullish taking cue from the recent rally in US Treasuries and further policy easing on the global front, with South Korea unexpectedly cutting its key policy rate by 25 basis points (bps) to 3.00%. In addition, benign domestic inflation and interest rate outlook provided further catalyst for market players to extend investments to longer-dated bonds, as reflected in the drop of c.14-28bps in 10-, 15-, and 20-yr MGS benchmarks yields to settle at 3.36%, 3.57% and 3.70% respectively

Trading in local govvies was mixed as the bullish sentiment in the early parts of the month reversed towards the second half of August following higher than expected second quartery of 2012 Gross Domestic Product (GDP). Nevertheless, the selling momentum subsided as speculations of Quantitative Easing 3 (QE3) gained momentum in the US. With the Aidifitri and Merdeka holidays coming in the last two weeks of August, it was not a surprised that MGS/GII volume dropped to RM54.1 billion from the year-to-date high of RM87.1 billion in July.

The MGS/GII trading volume remained relatively weak in September with RM32.0 billion worth of trades done. Most market players stayed on the sidelines ahead of the Budget 2013 which was announced at the end of the month and profit taking was evident across all tenures of the MGS benchmarks.

Market Outlook

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) lowered its growth forecasts of the world economy to 3.3% in 2012 (from 3.5% projected in July), the slowest since the 2009 recession. The agency further warned that it sees alarmingly high risks of a steeper slowdown, with about 16% chance of growth slipping below 2%, as the euro-debt crisis intensifies amidst the looming US fiscal cliff.

Elsewhere in Asia, Japan and Thailand's industrial production fell further and major indicator slowed down in August. Bank of Thailand (BOT) unexpectedly cut its benchmark one-day repurchase rate by 0.25% to 2.75% on 17 Oct, the first time since January, in a bid to shore up economic growth. On the same day, countries in the ASEAN region including Malaysia saw it govvies rallied by a fair bit as foreign investors are positioning on a possible spillover of rate cut exercise by other regional Central Banks. Lastly, Singapore and China reported a mildly disappointing third quarter (3Q) GDP numbers with Singapore's dropping by an annualized rate of 1.5% (second quarter: 0.2%) and China's moderated to 7.4% (second quarter: 7.6% and first quarter: 8.1%). China's 3Q GDP marked the 7th consecutive quarter of deceleration, on the back of the lagged effect arising from the previous policy tightening to contain inflation and a softer external demand for the country's exports.

Notwithstanding the weaker global outlook, US unemployment rate unexpectedly fell to 7.8% in September, after moderating to 8.1% in August. This was the

lowest level in more than 3 years, pointing to a steadier recovery in the job market than previously thought. The country's real GDP growth also rebounded to an annualized rate of 2.0% in the 3Q, after moderating to +1.3% in the first 2 quarters. As a whole, while the overall economy is on the right trajectory, it is still facing threat from the looming fiscal cliff, which could extract about USD600b from the economy. By that measure, it could cause the economy to contract by 0.5% in 2013, according to the estimated by Congressional Budget Office (CBO).

Looking ahead, there is significant amount of events that could shape financial market. US presidential election, China Party Congress, Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA), BNM, Bank Indonesia (BI) and Bank of Korea (BoK)'s MPC meetings are some of the key events that will provide further guidance on the region's interest rate outlook in the face of weaker global economy prospect. Currently, market is expecting RBA to further cut its Cash Rate by another 25bps to 3.00% and BNM, BI and BoK to hold rate constant

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. **GENERAL INFORMATION**

ABF Malaysia Bond Index Fund ("the Fund") was established pursuant to a Deed dated 12 July 2005 as amended by Deeds Supplemental thereto ("the Deed"), between AmInvestment Services Berhad as the Manager, HSBC (Malaysia) Trustee Berhad as the Trustee and all unitholders.

The Fund was set up with the objective for investors who seek an "index-based" approach to investing in a portfolio of Ringgit Malaysia denominated Government and quasi-Government debt securities. As provided in the Deeds, the "accrual period" or financial year shall end on 31 December and the units in the Fund were first offered for sale on 13 July 2005.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS").

Introduction of Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards

On 19 November 2011, the Malaysian Accounting Standards Board (MASB) issued a new MASB approved accounting framework, the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS Framework") that will replace the existing Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS Framework").

The MFRS Framework comprises Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) that are effective on 1 January 2012. It also comprises new/revised Standards recently issued by the IASB that will be effective after 1 January 2012.

The MFRS Framework is to be applied by all entities other than private entities for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2012, with the exception of entities that are within the scope of MFRS 141 *Agriculture* (MFRS 141) and IC Interpretation 15 *Agreement for Construction of Real Estate* (IC 15), including its parent, significant investor and venturer (herein called "Transitioning Entities").

Transitioning Entities will be allowed to defer adoption of the new MFRS Framework for an additional two years. Consequently, adoption of the MFRS Framework by Transitioning Entities will be mandatory for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2014.

The key differences between the FRS Framework and MFRS Framework are that in the former, (a) FRS 201₂₀₀₄ *Property Development Activities* will continue to be the extant standard for accounting for property development activities and not IC 15, and (b) there is no equivalent standard to IAS 41 Agriculture.

The Fund is in the process of assessing the impact to the Fund as a result of the change to the new MFRS Framework.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Income Recognition

Income is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Fund and the income can be reliably measured. Income is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable

Interest income on fixed income securities and short-term deposits are recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method, which includes the accretion of discount and amortisation of premium.

Income Tax

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the tax authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Current taxes are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that the tax relates to items recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Functional and Presentation Currency

Functional currency is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions. This is the Ringgit Malaysia which reflects the currency of the economy in which the Fund competes for funds, issues and redeems units. The Fund has also adopted Ringgit Malaysia as its presentation currency.

Statement of Cash Flows

The Fund adopts the direct method in the preparation of the statement of cash flows.

Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to cash with insignificant risk of changes in value.

Distribution

Distributions are at the discretion of the Fund. A distribution to the Fund's unitholders is accounted for as a deduction from realised reserves except where distribution is sourced out of distribution/loss equalisation which is accounted for as a deduction from unitholders' capital. A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the period in which it is approved.

Unitholders' Capital

The unitholders' capital of the Fund meets the definition of puttable instruments and is classified as equity instruments under the revised FRS 132.

Distribution/Loss Equalisation

Distribution/loss equalisation represents the average distributable amount included in the creation and cancellation prices of units. This amount is either refunded to unitholders by way of distribution and/or adjusted accordingly when units are cancelled.

Financial Assets

Financial assets are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

When financial assets are recognised initially, they are measured at fair value, plus, in the case of financial assets not at fair value through profit or loss, directly attributable transaction costs.

The Fund determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition, and the categories applicable to the Fund include as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL") and loans and receivables.

(i) Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets are classified as financial assets at FVTPL if they are held for trading or are designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial assets held for trading by the Fund include fixed income securities acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the near term.

Subsequent to initial recognition, financial assets at FVTPL are measured at fair value. Changes in the fair value of those financial instruments are recorded in 'Net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss'. Interest earned elements of such instruments, are recorded separately in 'Interest income'.

Investments are stated at fair value on a portfolio basis in accordance with the provisions of the Deed, fair value is determined based on prices provided by the index provider, Markit Indices Limited [formerly known as International Index Company Limited ("IIC")], plus accrued interest. Adjusted cost of investments relates to the purchase cost plus accrued interest, adjusted for amortisation of premium and accretion of discount, if any, calculated over the period from the date of acquisition to the date of maturity of the respective securities as approved by the Manager and the Trustee. Unrealised gains or losses recognised in the statement of comprehensive income are not distributable in nature.

On disposal of investments, the net realised gain or loss on disposal is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the investments. The net realised gain or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as loans and receivables. The Fund includes short-term receivables in this classification.

Subsequent to initial recognition, loans and receivables are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the loans and receivables are derecognised or impaired, and through the amortisation process.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Fund assesses at each reporting date whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired.

(i) Loans and receivables carried at amortised cost

To determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on financial assets has been incurred, the Fund considers factors such as the probability of insolvency or significant financial difficulties of the debtor and default or significant delay in payments.

If any such evidence exists, the amount of impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When loans and receivables become uncollectible, they are written off against the allowance account.

If in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset does not exceed its amortised cost at the reversal date. The amount of reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability.

Financial liabilities, within the scope of FRS 139, are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

The Fund's financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

Classification of Realised and Unrealised Gains and Losses

Unrealised gains and losses comprise changes in the fair value of financial instruments for the period and from reversal of prior period's unrealised gains and losses for financial instruments which were realised (i.e. sold, redeemed or matured) during the reporting period.

Realised gains and losses on disposals of financial instruments classified at fair value through profit or loss are calculated using the weighted average method. They represent the difference between an instrument's initial carrying amount and disposal amount.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of the Fund's financial statements requires the Manager to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability in the future.

The Fund classifies its investments as financial assets at FVTPL as the Fund may sell its investments in the short-term for profit-taking or to meet unitholders' cancellation of units.

No other major judgments have been made by the Manager in applying the Fund's accounting policies. There are no key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within next financial period.

Risk management is carried out by closely monitoring, measuring and mitigating the above said risks, careful selection of investment coupled with stringent compliance to investment restrictions as stipulated by the Capital Market and Services Act 2007, Securities Commission's Guidelines on Exchange Traded Funds and the Deed as the backbone of risk management of the Fund.

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of a portfolio would decrease due to changes in market risk factors such as equity prices, foreign exchange rates, interest rates and commodity prices.

(a) Objectives and limitations of the Value at Risk ("VaR") methodology

The Fund models the Value-at-Risk based on Gaussian distribution to assess possible changes in the market value of the portfolio. Based on 180 weekly historical data points, the potential loss at the 99% confidence level is estimated. The VaR model is designed to measure market risk during normal market conditions. Due to the fact that VaR relies on historical data to provide information and that there is no prediction of the future change in the risk factors, the probability of large market movement may be underestimated. VaR may also be under- or over-estimated due to the interdependence between the market risk factors. Even though positions may change throughout the day, the VaR only represents the risk of the portfolio at the close of each business day. Analysis is carried out to estimate potential losses at 99% confidence level.

In practice, the actual portfolio results will differ from the VaR calculation. In particular, the calculation does not provide a meaningful indication of losses under stressed market conditions.

(b) VaR assumptions

The VaR that the Fund measures is an estimate, using a confidence level of 99%, of the potential loss that is not expected to be exceeded if the current market risk positions were to be held unchanged for one day. The use of a 99% confidence level means that, within a one day horizon, losses exceeding the VaR figure should occur, on average under normal market conditions, not more than once every hundred days.

Based on the Gaussian VaR, using historical weekly data for the past 180 weeks, ABF Malaysia Bond Index portfolio that invests mainly in Ringgit denominated fixed income securities had a daily 1% Value-at-Risk (VaR) of approximately 0.35% (2011: 0.54%). This implies that not more than 1 out of 100 trading days would record a daily loss exceeding 0.35% (2011: 0.54%) of the net asset value.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that the counterparty to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the Fund by failing to discharge an obligation. The Fund invests a minimum of 95% of the net asset value of the Fund in local bonds. As such the Fund would be exposed to the risk of bond issuers defaulting on its repayment obligations which in turn would effect the net asset value of the Fund. This risk is mitigated by performing continuous fundamental credit research and analysis to ascertain the creditworthiness of the relevant issuers.

There is no geographical risk as the Fund invests only in Malaysia.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is defined as the risk of being unable to raise funds or borrowing to meet payment obligations as they fall due. The Fund maintains sufficient level of liquid assets, after consultation with the Trustee, to meet anticipated payments and cancellation of units by unitholders. Liquid assets comprise cash deposits with licensed financial institutions and other instruments, which are capable of being converted into cash within 5 to 7 days. The Fund's policy is to always maintain a prudent level of liquid assets so as to reduce liquidity risk.

Objectives and Assumptions

The coupons could be paid on annual, bi-annual or quarterly basis. Alongside with those bonds are zero coupon bonds that only pay the nominal amount at maturity date. Cash received from bonds are calculated as follows:

\$ = cash received

R = annual coupon rate

F = coupon frequency

- For zero coupon bonds, F = 0
 At maturity: \$ = Nominal
- For F > 0
 Before maturity: coupon payment, \$ = Nominal * (R/F)

Single Issuer Risk

Internal policy restricts the Fund from investing in securities issued by any issuer of not more than a certain percentage of its net asset value. Under such restriction, the risk exposure to the securities of any single issuer is diversified and managed based on internal/external ratings.

Regulatory Risk

Any changes in national policies and regulations may have effects on the capital market and the net asset value of the Fund.

Management Risk

Poor management of the Fund may cause considerable losses to the Fund that in turn may affect the net asset value of the Fund.

Non-Compliance Risk

This is the risk of the Manager, the Trustee or the Fund not complying with internal policies, the Deed of the Fund, securities law or guidelines issued by the regulators. Non-compliance risk may adversely affect the investments of the Fund when the Fund is forced to rectify the non-compliance.

20. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The primary objective of the Fund's capital management is to ensure that it maximises unitholder's value by expanding its fund size to benefit from economies of scale and achieving growth in net asset value from the performance of its investments. As disclosed in Note 10, the approved fund size by the Securities Commission is 1,000,000,000 units of which 537,421,800 units have been issued and a further 462,578,200 units can be issued in future period based on the daily net asset value per unit on the respective creation dates.

The Fund manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it, in light of changes in economic conditions. To maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Fund may issue new or bonus units, make distribution payment, or return capital to unitholders by way of redemption of units.

No changes were made in the objective, policies or processes during the financial periods ended 30 September 2012 and 30 September 2011.
