PART A - EXPLANATORY NOTES

A1 Basis of preparation

The condensed interim financial statements, other than for financial instruments have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

This Condensed Report has also been prepared in accordance with the requirements of MFRS 134 *Interim Financial Reporting*, International Accounting Standard (IAS) 34 *Interim Financial Reporting* and paragraph 9.22 of the Main Market Listing Requirements of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad.

This Condensed Report should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements of the Company for the financial year ended 31 May 2018. These explanatory notes provide an explanation of events and transactions that are significant to an understanding of the changes in the financial position and performance of the Company since the year ended 31 May 2018.

2.2 The nature and impact of MFRS 9 Financial Instruments

MFRS 9 Financial Instruments

MFRS 9 (IFRS 9 issued by IASB in July 2014) replaces the guidance in MFRS 139 on the classification and measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities, impairment of financial assets, and on hedge accounting.

The initial application of MFRS 9 is not expected to have any material impact to the financial statements of the Company for the current financial year and prior periods as the Company will apply the standard retrospectively from 1 June 2018 with the practical expedients permitted under the standard, and that the comparatives (i.e. current period financial information) will not be restated.

Classification and Measurement

MFRS 9 contains a new classification and measurement approach for financial assets that reflects the business model in which the financial assets are managed and their cash flow characteristics. This new accounting standard contains 3 principal classification categories for financial assets:-

- Amortised cost ("AC")
- Fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL")
- Fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVTOCI")

The standard eliminates the existing MFRS 139 categories of held to maturity ("HTM"), loans and receivables ("LAR") and available-for-sale ("AFS") financial assets.

The basis of classification on a financial asset depends on an entity's business model and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset. Investments in equity instruments are always measured at fair value through profit or loss with an irrevocable option at inception to present changes in fair value in other comprehensive income (provided the instrument is not held for trading). A debt instrument is measured at amortised cost only if the entity is holding it to collect contractual cash flows and the cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest.

The impacts upon the Company's initial application are summarised below:-

- (i) Under MFRS 9, the Company has designated its entire investments in quoted securities (currently classified as available-for-sale financial assets) to be measured at FVTOCI as these investments are held for long-term strategic purposes.
- (ii) The remaining financial assets are debt instruments (currently classified as loans and receivables financial assets) that are held to collect contractual cash flows which meet the criteria to be measured at AC under MFRS 9.

Therefore, the Company does not expect the new standard to affect the measurement of its financial assets.

For financial liabilities, there will be no changes to the classification and measurement between MFRS 139 and MFRS 9 as these items will continue to be measured under AC.

A2 Significant accounting policies (con't)

2.2 The nature and impact of MFRS 9 Financial Instruments (con't)

Impairment of Financial Assets

MFRS 9 replaces the 'incurred loss' model in MFRS 139 with an 'expected credit loss' ("ECL") model. The new impairment model is forward-looking and eliminates the need for a trigger event to have occurred before credit losses are recognised. It involves a 3-stage approach under which financial assets move through the stages as their credit quality changes.

The new impairment model applies to financial assets measured at AC, debt instruments measured at FVTOCI, contract assets, lease receivables, loan commitments and certain financial guarantee contracts.

The Company has determined that, based on its assessment on the market information currently available and the reputation and past credit history of the counterparties which the Company transacted with, the impacts of ECL on trade and other receivables (including related party balances) are insignificant upon the initial application of MFRS 9.

Impacts of the Adoption of MFRS 9

As allowed by the transitional provisions of MFRS 9, the Company will not restate comparative information of its financial instruments upon the adoption of MFRS 9 in which any transitional adjustment is to be recognised in retained profits (or other equivalent equity component) as at 1 June 2018 (i.e. date of initial application of MFRS 9).

Other than those disclosed above, the Company's retained profits as at 1 June 2018 has increased by approximately RM22 million due to reclassification of impairment under fair value reserve from the classification of financial assets from AFS to FVTOCI upon its initial application of MFRS 9.

The analysis above are based on the assessments undertaken to date and maybe subject to changes arising from further detailed analysis or additional reasonable and supportable information being made available to the Company in the future.

B1 Review of performance (Para 9.40) (con't)

As the Company is a closed-ended fund, a better indication of its performance would be the movement of its Net Assets Value ("NAV"). The Company's NAV decreased to RM458.35 million as at 28 February 2019 from RM487.54 million as at 28 February 2018. This resulted in a reduction of NAV per share as at 28 February 2019 to RM3.27, compared with NAV per share of RM3.48 as at 28 February 2018, a decrease of 6.03%. The decrease was mainly due to a reduction in fair value of investments offset by gain of RM16.10 million from disposal of shares.

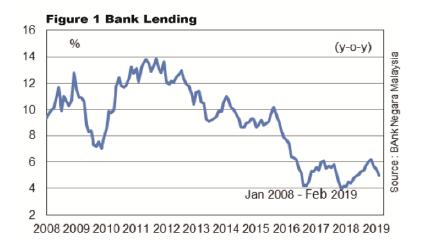

B3 Commentary by Fund Manager – Prospects Para (9.40)

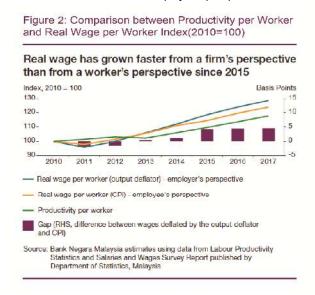
For top-down/market-timing investors – please read this section.

Malaysia's economy is muddling through the current global slowdown. As the global economy has weakened, Malaysia's domestic demand is important in cushioning its adverse impact. On this front, the weak growth in bank lending (figure 1) does not portend a strong Malaysian domestic demand in 2019. What is also worrying is a squeeze to the profit margins of businesses in Malaysia.



B3 Commentary by Fund Manager – Prospects Para (9.40) (con't)

As Bank Negara pointed out in its 2018 Annual Report, "the gap between real wage growth from a firm's and worker's perspective has significantly widened, particularly since 2015." What this means is that wages have increased faster from an employer's perspective than from a worker's perspective (figure 2).



This is not a healthy trend. Profit margin is squeezed and yet workers complain of stagnant wages; prices of goods and services sold by firms increased at a slower pace than the prices of goods and services consumed by workers. In such an environment, businesses would be reluctant to hire additional staff. Can domestic demand remain robust? Overall, Malaysia's economy is not expected to perform robustly in 2019.

Meanwhile, the OECD Composite Leading Indicator (CLI) which peaked in 2017 and has been declining since then, shows no sign of reversing its decline. The same can be said for global semiconductor sales as the fall in sales growth has accelerated since our last commentary.

For long term value investors – please read this section.

icapital.biz Berhad is a Malaysia-focused fund, with an objective of long-term capital appreciation based on the Bamboo value investing philosophy of Capital Dynamics. It is not allowed to sell short, invest in derivatives or undertake any borrowings.

By end February 2019, the cash holdings of icapital.biz Berhad has dropped to RM296.36 million from around RM306.39 million as at the end of 31st December 2018.

Additional Commentary by Fund Manager

Defamation Suit – A victory for the small guy

Many of you may have heard of Capital Dynamics' and my legal battle against Cindy Yeap, a senior editor from The Edge, who sought to defame us with her article titled "icapital.biz fund fees high. To vote down reappointment of directors" published on 14 September 2015. The article in question claimed all manner of falsehoods, primarily in reliance on a letter published by City of London Investment Management, a substantial shareowner of icapital.biz Berhad fund (ICAP), who took the sneaky approach of getting it published on the London Stock Exchange via the Regulatory News Service (RNS). For those who may be impressed by this, anyone who has an RNS account can also "post" on the London Stock Exchange.

B3 Commentary by Fund Manager – Prospects Para (9.40) (con't)

In the said article, the senior editor intentionally and maliciously misled her readers into thinking that the fees of icapital.biz Berhad were unreasonably high, that our fund was underperforming and that its Designated Person and Capital Dynamics were acting irresponsibly.

We are pleased to announce that the Kuala Lumpur High Court has, on 7th December 2018, concluded the matter in our favour.

After hearing the cases of the respective parties, Judge Rohani Ismail concluded that the Designated Person and Capital Dynamics had successfully proved the defamatory nature of the said article. Judge Rohani Ismail considered that the article reported selectively and thus resulted in the reputation of Capital Dynamics and Tan Teng Boo being tarnished. Cindy Yeap attempted to defend her article on the grounds of fair comment, justification and qualified privilege, but failed on all counts. As a result, the High Court awarded damages and costs to the Plaintiffs and ordered an injunction to restrain Cindy Yeap, her servants, agents or otherwise, from further publishing similar defamatory words about us in all media.

We are grateful to have your support during these trying times and hope that this precedent will play a part in discouraging the increasingly apparent phenomenon of false reporting and mudslinging in print and digital publications.

Fake "Tan Teng Boo"

At the same time, it has come to our notice that an individual has portrayed himself as Tan Teng Boo, and posted comments on investment websites, blogs, forums and/or online platforms under the name "Tan Teng Boo" ("the Impersonator"). The contents of the comments posted by the Impersonator involve investments advice/opinion and matters. The impersonator/s has intentionally made comments that may be construed as investment advice and opinions of Tan Teng Boo, your fund's Designated Person and the managing director of Capital Dynamics.

We would like to put on record that the comments posted by the Impersonator, and any comments and/or statements posted and/or made in any online forums or platforms, other than the official website of Capital Dynamics, the *i* Capital publication, www.icapital.biz or its official social media accounts, or official representations by Capital Dynamics through any other media platforms, including online or offline media, digital or in paper, purportedly under the name of Tan Teng Boo, Capital Dynamics and/or its group of companies, are made without the consent knowledge and/or approval of Tan Teng Boo, Capital Dynamics and/ or its group of companies, and do not represent the opinion, comments and/or views of Tan Teng Boo, Capital Dynamics and/or its group of companies.

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I also seek the cooperation of our share owners and friends to immediately report any accounts registered under "Tan Teng Boo" and "Capital Dynamics" or "i Capital" in any unofficial platforms, digital or otherwise, to us at legal@capitaldynamics.biz.
